This Week's Focus: The sluggard sees work as a necessary evil but through the Gospel, we recognize that our world was designed by God and He saw the value in work and effort. We are part of creation and our effort each day is an act of worship to the Creator.

Observations and Questions for Discussion:

- What was most inspiring about this week's sermon/text?
- What is a sluggard? Which of the following characteristics of the sluggard do you wrestle with most: laziness, procrastination, taking the path of least resistance, apathy?
- Read Proverbs 22:13. Is the sluggard afraid or is he making excuses? What is he really afraid of?

- According to Proverbs 19:15, Proverbs 20:13, and Proverbs 24:30-34, sleep is detrimental to living a life characterized by wisdom. Why? Contrast this with the principle of Sabbath rest.
- How is the sluggard self-seeking, a pleasure seeker, and short-sighted. Reference Proverbs 21:25 and Proverbs 6:6-8.
- What are the destructive consequences of being slothful? How is laziness a detriment to the sluggard's friends, family, and community?
- Explain how the workaholic is really a sluggard.
- What evidence is there in Scripture that work is a gift to humans from God? Why then do we often view it as a curse?
- The Gospel teaches us that work is meant to be viewed and performed as an act of worship to God. Reference 1 Corinthians 10:31. What practical ways can we remind ourselves of this daily? How does this transform how we approach our work and result in increased productivity?
